

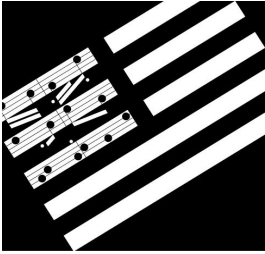

Program Notes

GIGGLES by Jan Mittelstaedt

This piece is based on the pentatonic (five tone) scale...Although there are many different pentatonic scales, *Giggles* was created from one which uses only black keys. *Giggles* is one of my first compositions for piano and is included in my first published collection, *Solo Snips*.

CHILDHOOD MEMORIES by Dianne Davies

This is the composer's third piece written for piano solo. This piece was inspired by the ageless children's taunt of "Nanny Nanny Boo Boo" and the intrigue of a NFMC Festival required composition, based on changing meters, performed by her student. The ABA form felt like a good start.

THE MERRYANDREW (Merry Andrew) by Jan Mittelstaedt

This music depicts the antics of a clown. The A section is playful with a scherzo feel (the happy clown) and the B section is slower, more lyrical, and begins with an A Minor chord (the sad clown). George Gershwin wrote a piece called *Merry Andrew* as have others.

THE MUSIC BOX BALLERINA in F Major by John DeRuntz

This music box slows down and speeds up just like a real dancer.

DANCE OF HOPE (Tarantella) by Jan Mittelstaedt

"*Tarantella*" is a group of various folk dances characterized by a fast, upbeat tempo, usually in 6/8 time ...accompanied by tambourines. It is among the most recognized forms of traditional southern Italian music. (Wikipedia) Tarantism is a hysterical condition. It was believed that the bite of a "wolf spider" or "tarantula" could cause tarantism. According to an ancient Greek myth, victims would begin dancing to music like our tarantellas and their tarantism would disappear. **Dance of Hope** addresses the chaos in our world (tarantism) with the hope that positive action (tarantella) will bring peace (healing).

SOUND BITES FOR PIANO: Thematic Introductions to the Minors, Modes and Other Scales by Nicholas Yandell

1. *A Song for the Raven*: As a short work, this piece is the theme music for the raven: a dark, mysterious, and shady character.
2. *The Open Road*: This work introduces a traveler overlooking miles of open space and the road with no end in sight that they are about to set off on.
3. *Through the City Gates*: This is a work about facing a metropolitan cityscape for the first time and all the wonder and intimidation it brings.
4. *Let it Rain*: This song is about staring out at a rainy afternoon, letting go, perhaps even crying, and through these actions, finding release.
5. *A Walk Through the Ruins*: This work paints a sound picture of ancient ruins in the early evening just before sunset. The crescendo is the setting sun blazing through the top of a chapel which was once adorned with a magnificent stained-glass window. For a moment glory of this building is restored and then quickly fades away.
6. *The Sword of Damocles*: The title references a story from ancient history and is about a feeling of ever present fear and apprehension hanging over oneself.

PRELUDE NO. 6 in G Minor by John DeRuntz

Variations of the opening phrases gradually move this piece into the key of F Minor in the melancholy central section. The return to the home key is unexpectedly dramatic and eventually leads to a closing cascade of descending sixths in the treble.

From FAMILY PORTRAIT Five Vignettes for Piano by Greg A Steinke

Family Portrait for Piano was written as a remembrance of my family in 1976–78. It is dedicated to and was presented as a present to my in-laws, Carl and Rose Larsen. It is built around two short pieces originally written as birth announcements for my two sons, Carl and Kyle. Thus, most of the musical materials for the other movements for “Dad,” “Mom” and Clara, our dog at the time, are ultimately derived from *Music* for Carl Asa and *Lullaby* for Kyle Alban. *Family Portrait* was premiered in March of 1978 in Olympia, Washington by Diane DeMoulin, a piano student at the time at The Evergreen State College.

PRELUDE NO. 3 in A Major by John DeRuntz

A delicate, contemplative piece in 5/4 time that seems to stop and start due to the irregular meter... I was inspired to write this as a Christmas gift for a friend who appreciated my music.

LONESOME WALTZ by Dianne Davies

This is the composer’s second piece written for piano solo. This piece was inspired by an original waltz composed by a fellow student of Lisa Marsh. A waltz and ABA form came naturally. The middle section of the piece is built on the diminished scale (whole, half, whole, half, etc. or just the opposite). The loneliness and sadness of this piece expresses the grief she felt as a child after her only sister died when Dianne was eleven.

LIKE SPIDERS ACROSS THE STARS by Nicholas Yandell

This piece is a piano arrangement of a work I originally wrote for mandolin and ukulele duet. The title is a line from Jack Kerouac’s *On the Road* but gained a life of its

own when I attempted to audiate the actual visual image contained within the simile. Just imagine some spiders crawling around in the cosmos...

REFLECTIONS in G Major by John DeRuntz

Perhaps this is actually a classical jazz ballad. It was transcribed from an acoustic guitar piece I wrote many years ago.

THE NEWEST CHAPTER by Paul Safar

This short piano piece was written for my daughter's high school graduation. The musical seed of it came from a sweet little Father's Day gift she made for me back in elementary school that had four random musical pitches on it. I used those pitches as the starting point for the piece. I hoped to convey a sense of demarcation of a new time in one's life as well as the open ended quality of ones future.

PHRYGIAN DYNASTY II by Liz Nedela

Plagal Phrygian: E-E with strong use of B (the plagal) with a "hint" of the formation of impending historic development of a m3rd, which eventually becomes a relative major (G) intervals of 5ths, 4ths; arpeggios (hand over hand); repeated notes, cross-hands; syncopation by "displaced accents" and ties...

MINSTREL MUSIC FOR THE COURT OF KING ARTHUR by David S. Bernstein

This is a composition that contains a short chorale-like lyrical idea contrasted with a more lyrical theme mid-way in the work. In form it is a simple ternary design which suggests also a variation process involved with both the material of the A and B sections. Other characteristics of this piece are the cross rhythms and meters of 3/4 and 6/8. Intervals of fourths and fifths are prominent and certain modal harmonic progressions as well as harmonic progressions from the 19th century are also featured.

ECLECTIC ETUDE by Jan Mittelstaedt

This composition is made up of a mixture of styles (e.g. classical and popular), rhythms, and melodies. Fragments of a few songs from the 1950's are included.

ETUDE NO. 5 in F Sharp Minor by John DeRuntz

This music is a study concentrating on the technique of playing notes of a melody in the treble by crossing the left hand over the right while still maintaining the bass line.

Rascals on a Theme from OVERTURE OF THE ROCKIES* by Nicholas Yandell

I originally wrote this for my master's project, a symphonic work entitled: *Overture of the Rockies*. The work featured numerous American folk songs from the 1800's, and after working with these songs for months, I decided to write one myself in that style. This song became *Rascals*, a short, playful take on rambunctious mountain life.

BLEECKER STREET by Nicholas Yandell

Bleecker Street gained its name in part from where I was when I came up with the ostinato bass part that begins and is played throughout the composition. This title also reflects my impression of the bustling atmosphere one enters when walking on this street in Greenwich Village in New York City.

MIXOLYDIAN TAG by Liz Nedela

Tag is taken from a set of duets based on Modes: *DUETS ON THE MODE*. The modes were used before Bach's time, and are sometimes still used today. The tonal system (scales) that we know were developed in the 1600's and came from the modes. The fifth note of the mode developed into the beginning of the next scale. Each scale begins on the fifth note of the one preceding it. In order to follow the "new" scale system, key signatures were developed. Each key contained sharps or flats to show the series of half and whole steps of each scale. The modes had many variations. *Tag* is based on the mixolydian mode from G-G. The fifth note of the mode was sometimes used to begin the mode, which placed emphasis that the fifth note was prominent.

Composer Biographies

David S. Bernstein

David Bernstein's music has seen its expression in a wide variety of genres. His concert music ranges from compositions for the theatre and musical theatre to works for dance, opera, orchestra, chorus, band and many varied chamber music ensembles. His music has been performed in many areas of the United States, Canada, South America, and Europe. He has traveled widely and given lectures on his music in Vienna, Paris, Warsaw, Posnan, Crakow, The Eastman School of Music, The University of Alberta, The University of Southern California, New York University, The University of Kentucky, and many others. His music is published by G. Schirmer, Acoma Productions, Ludwig Music Publications, Willis Music, Abingdon Press, Lawson-Gould, Dorn Productions, Music for Percussion, Inc., and most recently, Clear Note Publications. Bernstein earned a B.M. and M.M. from Florida State University and a doctorate in music composition with distinction from Indiana University.

Dianne Davies

Dianne Davies, BA in music from Lewis and Clark College with piano emphasis and K-12 music education certification, has taught public and private school music and currently focuses on her private piano studio, performing and her family. In February of 2016, she created her own show titled Attachments & Detachments Tragedy to Triumph combining the music of Cascadia Composers with dance, live art and theatre to tell her own transparent story. Simultaneously, she created her comedy show titled, *Dianne Davies has Fallen off her Bench*. It is classically funny with traces of Victor Borge, Carol Burnett, Liberace, Igudesman & Joo and P.D.Q. Bach, including *Soleful* playing with her feet to performing upside down and backwards. A new facet in her musical life is composing. She has been under the mentorship of Lisa Ann Marsh since 2016. The two pieces on this program are among her very first compositions.

John De Runtz

John DeRuntz pianist and composer, competed in the prestigious Van Cliburn Sixth International Piano Competition for Outstanding Amateurs in Fort Worth, Texas in May of 2011. To hear a number of his works, log on to the website: <http://www.theunknowncomposer.com>. John has composed more than seventy classical, romantic and impressionistic piano pieces, and fifty of them appear on four CD albums, Soaring, Fantasia, Reverie and Encore. David Stabler, the music critic for the Oregonian, has written of John's music as being, "in a lyrical style suggestive of Chopin." Another music critic, Olin Chism, of the Fort Worth Star- Telegram, wrote, "He is unabashedly

old-fashioned, composing in a sort of neo-Chopin style that was kind of charming. A couple of his melodies lingered in memory." John spent his professional career as an internationally known and award-winning mathematician, scientist and professor, teaching physics at the University of California, Berkeley, and later was a Senior Staff Scientist at the Lockheed Research Laboratory in Palo Alto, California.

Jan Mittelstaedt

Jan Mittelstaedt, B.S. in education from Bucknell University, B.A. in music from Marylhurst University and M.M. in composition from The University of Portland, continues to work with her mentor, Dr. Walter Saul. Jan participated in the Ernest Bloch Composers Symposium in 1993, was the Oregon Music Teachers Association Composer of the Year in 1994, has received ASCAP special awards since 1994, and has published piano music. A teacher of piano and composition, Jan has an active studio, is a member of the OMTA piano syllabus adjudicating staff and serves the organization in other ways. In 2017, she received an Honorary State Membership award. Her music has been performed in six states not including two of her student piano pieces which have been performed all over the country in various NFMC Junior Festivals. Jan is a past president of Cascadia Composers and remains on the board of directors. www.sintsink.com.

Liz Nedela

Liz Nedela, MM, Med, BA, teaches piano and composition in Vancouver, WA. She is fond of contemporary composition techniques, counterpoint, ethnic, modal and early music, and weaves these aspects into her compositions. She writes music in many genres, instruments and voice, completing commissions from music teachers' organizations, church, orchestra, chamber music, Women's Music festivals, and private individuals and ensembles for concerts and special events. She has earned an MM in composition (winning a Composer Showcase award and scholarships); and a BA and MEd with focus on piano, composition, English, and theater, devising a program for teaching composition. For several years, she served as the Montana State and the Northwest Division chair of composition for MTNA (Music Teachers National Association). In 2014, Liz was awarded the WSMETA (Washington chapter of MTNA) Composer of the Year, resulting in Penta-Moods, a study in pentatonic modes. She is an active member of Cascadia Composers and other music organizations and has served as adjudicator in piano and composition.

Paul Safar

Paul Safar is a versatile composer/performer and private piano instructor living and working in Eugene, Oregon. He performs regularly with the soprano Nancy Wood and thrives on collaborative projects. He has had commissions from the Delgani String Quartet and Oregon Parks Department and was the Oregon Music Teachers Association Composer of The Year for 2013-14. Paul's compositions have been played at Fear No Music concerts and the North American Saxophone Alliance, among other venues. His music has been performed in New York, Seattle, Cincinnati and Havana. Having a balanced background in both Classical and Jazz/Rock, Paul often tries to coherently combine these influences in his compositions. As an instructor, Paul enjoys sharing his knowledge of composition to both young students and piano teachers. He is a proud, card carrying member of Cascadia Composers, the Portland based chapter of NACUSA. When he isn't engaged in musical activities, he might be hiking, running or spending time with his family.

Greg A Steinke

Greg Steinke is former Chair, Departments of Art and Music, (The Joseph Naumes Endowed Chair in Music), also Associate Dean of Undergraduate Studies, Marylhurst University, Marylhurst, Oregon (retired, 6/15/01); Associate Director, Ernest Bloch Music Festival ('93–97) and Director, Composers Symposium ('90– 97) (Newport, OR); Holds a B.M. degree from Oberlin Conservatory, a M.M. degree from Michigan State University, a M.F.A. degree from the University of Iowa, and a Ph.D. from Michigan State University. Articles on new oboe literature and music composition; revisions to the Paul Harder Harmonic Materials in Tonal Music, 6th-10th Ed., Basic Materials in Music Theory, 7th-13th Ed., Bridge to Twentieth-Century Music, Rev. Ed. for Pearson, and with H Owen Reed the Harder-Reed Basic Contrapuntal Techniques for Warner Bros. Pub.; and article, "Music for Dance: An Overview" in The Dance Has Many Faces, Third Ed., Ed. by Walter Sorell, a cappella books. Served as the National Chairman of the Society of Composers, Inc. (1988–97) and currently national President of NACUSA ('12–); Board Member of NACUSA Cascadia. Composer of chamber and symphonic music with published/recorded works and performances across the US and internationally, speaker on interdisciplinary arts and oboe soloist specializing in contemporary music.

Nicholas Yandell

Nicholas Yandell is a Portland-based composer who specializes in the creation of concert works, film scores, post-rock songs, and electronic music. He has composed or collaborated on eight scores for short films and film projects and his concert works have been performed by groups such as 45th Parallel and the Delgani String Quartet as well many other groups and artists throughout Oregon, New York and Idaho. He holds a Masters of Music Composition and a Bachelor of Music from Five Towns College in Dix Hills, NY and his past composition teachers include Dr. Jill Miller-Thorn and Chuck Mymit of Five Towns College, Dr. Felipe Salles of University of Massachusetts Amherst, and Dr. Brad Hansen of Portland State University. He has taught composition privately and at Five Towns College and is currently a member of the Cascadia Composers and was on their board of directors from 2013-2015.

Performer Biographies

Ethan Chang, 11, started taking piano lessons from Fen-Fang Tsao when he was six and half years old, completing OMTA Piano Syllabus Level VI. He was the winner of numerous OMTA festivals and also plays the violin in PYP's Young String Ensemble.
